Deputy Minister Chen stated that, Taiwan recently concluded its 15th

presidential and vice-presidential and 10th legislative election. The results have

shown not only Taiwan's democratic maturity but the will of the public to uphold

sovereignty and oppose "one country, two systems." In recent years, the

Chinese Communist Party (CCP) has been threatening and intimidating Taiwan

militarily, suppressing Taiwan's international space, and dividing the Taiwanese

society with disinformation. In the face of such challenges, deputy Minister

Chen reiterated that the Republic of China (ROC) is a sovereign state. The CCP

must face the reality of the existence of the ROC. In the meantime, this

government will work to resume positive interaction and stable development with mainland China based on the principles of "peace, parity, democracy, and dialogue."

The results of the elections represent Taiwanese people's opposition of "one country, two systems" and show that if democracy and sovereignty are at risk, Taiwanese people will rise to defend these values. In this vein, deputy Minister Chen called on the CCP authorities to face the reality of the ROC's existence, respect the will of Taiwanese people, and handle cross-Strait differences with peace and parity in mind. In the future, the government will maintain its consistent policy towards Beijing; one that is based on peace and stability while at the same time in accordance with the key principles of "peace, parity, democracy, and dialogue" proposed by President Tsai. We will also engage in meaningful communication and exchanges with mainland China to resume positive interaction and stable development across the Taiwan Strait.

The government will continue to deal with cross-Strait affairs pragmatically and maintain a "non-provocative, non-adventurist" attitude.
